Covid-19

The year 2020 began just like any other with the usual planning and preparations for GAA activities taking place in January and February. However, news of a new virus in China began to hit the airwaves. Very soon a pandemic was declared as the coronavirus (Covid-19) took hold throughout the world. The first case arrived in Ireland at the end of February and the virus quickly spread to all counties. The pandemic affected all aspects of society. Schools, colleges, childcare facilities and cultural institutions were shut. All large gatherings were cancelled. Almost all businesses, venues and amenities were closed and non-essential travel and contact with other people were prohibited. The elderly and those with serious illnesses were advised to cocoon. Travel restrictions were imposed and 'Lockdown' became the 'new normal' for everyone, as daily cases and deaths from the virus were reported on news bulletins. The impact on social and economic life was huge. Unemployment soared as retail and hospitality were severely restricted. School exams were cancelled. Social events and activities were banned.

GAA activities came to a standstill, with pitches and premises closed. No meetings, no training, no matches! The Newport club endeavoured to keep in touch with players through the organising of activities online. Training drills were made available for players to practise on their own. Videos were compiled. Fundraisers were organised for various charities. WhatsApp and Facebook were overrun with competitions and nostalgic recalling of past games and personalities.

Clubs were permitted to return to training at the end of June in preparation for championships commencing a month later. Inter-county championships did not start until late October with All Ireland finals played just before Christmas. Changing rooms remained closed to teams and attendances at games were prohibited, although reduced numbers were allowed attend club games up to September. Water breaks became a new feature in all games.

Miscellaneous

- The Club Lotto was suspended but resumed by selling tickets online in July and the weekly draw was relayed live on Facebook.
- Newport GAA joined with Newport AFC to run Online Bingo hosted in the Community Hall. The venture proved very successful.
- The GAA Club set up a support group where members were available to help anyone in need due to Covid restrictions.
- A competition, hosted on Twitter by Nenagh Guardian, asking people to vote for their favourite club jersey in Tipperary was won by Newport, garnering more than 2,000 votes in the final against Borrisoleigh, having earlier seen off Silvermines, Toomevara and Roscrea.
- Newport/Ballinahinch camogie team won the County Intermediate Shield.
- Rockvale Rovers LGF won the county Junior 'C' Plate competition.
- The Club held a Drug & Alcohol Awareness Evening in St Mary's Secondary School in February. Speakers included addiction counsellor, Tipperary hurling legend John Leahy.

- Newport GAA Healthy Club Committee organised 'Ireland Lights Up' walking initiative in January and later in the year promoted Irish Life's 'Every Step Counts' virtual challenge, with Newport representatives clocking up huge mileage.
- The Annual Golf Classic was held at Nenagh Golf Club in August
- The senior hurlers organised 'The Road to Croker', an online GoFund Me page, as a fundraiser for Newport Day Centre. All the players combined to clock up the miles in their individual training programmes, equivalent to the distance in travelling to MacDonagh Park Nenagh, Semple Stadium, Páirc Uí Chaoímh and Croke Park. At the end of the campaign, €5,000 was presented to the Day Centre

The seniors made a less than auspicious start to their year when failing to Drom-Inch's second team in the league. Conor O'Mahony and Sean O'Brien were absentees. Mikey Gorman and Brendan Coffey made their senior debuts when introduced from the subs bench. Covid-19 then intervened and no further games were played in the league.

An impressive championship run began with a comprehensive win over Clonakenny. Sean O'Brien was still absent, but O'Mahony starred at centre back with Odhran Floyd wearing No. 3. Conor Floyd worked tirelessly, distributing good ball to the lively forwards from his midfield position. Darragh Carroll (0-9, 8f), Daniel Carew (1-3) and Colin Floyd (2-2) took the scoring honours. Newport announced themselves as championship contenders when they recorded a deserved win over Mullinahone. Four first half goals (Aaron O'Neill, Colin Floyd, Pa Ryan and Darragh Carroll) set them up for victory, although they had to withstand a strong second half comeback from the Southsiders. O'Mahony was an absentee, but Sean O'Brien took his place. Paul Hogan made his first championship start in goals. Eoin Kelly converted two penalties but Newport's defence stood strong in the closing stages as Mullinahone sought to reduce the gap.

Newport made hard work of beating Sean Treacys. Sean O'Brien was now at centre forward and helped himself to 1-2 as did Colin Floyd. Cian Flanagan stood out in defence.

Newport dominated Silvermines in the quarter final and registered an impressive tally on the scoreboard. Darragh Carroll was very accurate, accounting for 0-12 (2 from play), while Colin Floyd chipped in with 1-3. A downside was a serious knee injury to Conor Hickey which kept him out of the remainder of the campaign.

In the semi-final, Newport opened in great style and had raced into a seven point lead by the 20th minute, with the full forward line causing many problems for the Mullinahone defence. However, the experience of Eoin Kelly and the Curran brothers was a big factor in making up the deficit. A goal in the 53rd minute was the turning point, bringing them level. Both sides swapped scores from there to the end, but Mullinahone held out for the narrowest of wins. Colin Floyd maintained his good scoring form and ended up top scorer from play across all games in the county championship. Mike Flannery made some brilliant saves. Mullinahone went on to defeat Lorrha in the final and Newport were left wondering what might have been.

Almost 40 players, under 11 and 12, started back training in January and they managed to get two challenge matches in against Ballyboden and Newtownhandrum before lockdown. During the lockdown they did a series of skills challenges amongst themselves and then went on to take part in a team skills challenge against seven other teams from around the country - Ballyboden, Athenry, Sixmilebridge, Kilmacud, Ballina, Killeagh and De La Salle. The latter were the eventual winners after seven weeks of different online challenges. The Under 11's had a regular online training session each Saturday morning with coach, Richie Ryan, who set weekly challenges to practise. When they finally got back on the field, Newport fielded three Under 12 teams in hurling. After mixed results against all the other teams, the first team went on to wIn the club's first ever title in a very competitive 'A' grade. The final against Borrisoleigh was tight throughout. The crucial score came midway through the second half when Cormac Shanahan hit the net. Some heroic defending kept the Borris boys at bay in the closing stages. It took extra time to separate the teams in the county semi-final, but Dúrlas Óg's ability to score goals saw them secure victory in a thrilling contest

End of Year

- Sean O'Brien announced his retirement from inter-county hurling, having amassed a unique collection of All Ireland medals – Under 16, Minor, Under 21, Intermediate and Senior.
- At the AGM, which was deferred until January and held online, outgoing Secretary Majella Coffey made special mention of the efforts of the local schools in promoting Gaelic Games and thanked Cora Moroney, Cecil Ryan and Paudge Tobin for their work in organising coaches at primary level.



- The Treasurer reported a surplus of €26,912 for the year. Main items of expenditure included Field Maintenance €26,912, Team Registration €4,850 and Team Expenses €8,699, while the biggest sources of income were Club Lotto €31,617, County Draw €23,639 and Golf Classic €7,096.
- Chairman, James Collins, said he was proud of how the Club dealt with the Covid 19 situation in 2020. He referred to the great run of the senior hurlers. He set out what he thought were achievable goals for 2021 win the Seamus O'Riain Cup, win a North Junior 'B' Hurling Championship, be competitive at Under 21 and Under 19 and have a right good go at Junior Football. He had particular thanks for Majella Coffey (outgoing secretary) for her work over the past 4 years and outgoing Development Officer James Flanagan for the unbelievable achievements he had made in the development and maintenance of Lacken Park.
- Juvenile Committee Chairman, Ollie Kennedy, spoke about the biggest challenge presented by Covid keeping players engaged. He praised the coaches for their hard work and inventiveness. The fact that most kids in each group came back in July when lockdown ended was testament to the success of their efforts. He congratulated the Under 12 team who won the club's first ever North 'A' hurling title. He thanked James Flanagan (stepping down as Development Officer) for always having the field in pristine condition, and Mike Coffey for the passion and drive he brought to the coaching role.
- Juvenile Secretary, Ray Meaney referred to 2020 as a year that will live long in the memory
 for all the wrong reasons. Instead of training and playing matches, we were confined to our
 homes in what was an unprecedented and frightening time. However, the true heart of the
 GAA and our community was never seen in a better light as shopping was collected, meals
 delivered and the elderly and vulnerable cared for.

Obituaries in 2020

Eamon Rainsford, Murroe, died in January. Eamon transferred from Murroe in 1984 and continued to hurl with Newport until the end of the decade, winning a North Tipp Junior medal in 1988.

Tommy Moylan, Ballymackeogh, who died in January, was a loyal and lifelong supporter of Newport and Tipperary teams. He lined out with Mulcaire Rovers teams in the 1950's and was a committee member of that club.

Martin Bonfield, Tullow and formerly from Ballinahinch, died suddenly in February. He won a North Tipp Junior Hurling Championship with Ballinahinch in 1971. He had a long involvement with Newport Athletic Club. He made a wide and varied contribution to Newport GAA Club as selector and manager of numerous under-age and adult teams, Development Officer and Committee member.

Harry Ryan (Benson), Main St Newport, who died in April, was current Honorary President of Newport GAA Club. He served as a player, selector, club officer and worker since arriving in Newport from Cappamore in 1961. He was widely known due to his work as a building contractor, involvement in the greyhound industry and in running the Post Office in Newport. Harry Ryan received a Sean Ghael award from Tipperary GAA in 2011.

Patricia Carey (nee O'Brien), Rearcross and formerly from Derryleigh died in April. She was a founding member and long-time official of St Mary's Camogie Club, followed by a seven year stint as Secretary of the County Camogie Board. Patricia wrote the section on camogie for Volume One of By The Mulcaire Banks.

Kevin Bourke of Stonehall and formerly from Roscrea died in May following a protracted illness. He won North Tipp championship medals with Newport in Minor Football (2007) and Under 21 football (2010).

Ger Hayes of Ballysimon, Limerick and originally from Freigh, Newport died in July following a protracted illness. Ger lined out with Newport under-age footballers all through the 1970's, culminating in assisting the junior footballers in 1979.

Billy Bradshaw of Tullow, who died in October, was a keen hurling follower and served as a member of the Newport GAA committee in the mid 1970's. He was particularly well known for his association with the Newport Drama Group and helped produce many plays.

Bryan Ringrose of Mulcaire Manor was an active coach with Newport juvenile teams up to his untimely death in November after a short illness. The Limerick native's involvement was with the lower age groups, helping with the introduction of young players to hurling and football.

Charlie Small of Cully, who died suddenly in December, was a popular and widely respected member of the local farming community. He played hurling and football as a sturdy defender with Newport underage teams up to minor level.

Matthias (**Thiasy**) **Allen** of Killeen, Newport who died in December was a highly regarded member of the local farming community. He played with Mulcaire Rovers hurling teams during the 1950's.
